The Application of Treaties in Late Qing Focusing on the Prohibition of the Preaching Right of Japanese Monks

清末中国における条約の運用

日本人僧侶の布教権はいかにして拒まれたのか



With past experiences, China took a cautious attitude over the Japanese monks' missionary works in China and insisted that under the provisions of treaties Japanese monks did not have missionary rights in China. From 1904 to 1908, China and Japan had fierce debates on missionary affairs, especially on the rights of Japanese Buddhism in China. Until Qing Emperor abdicated (1912), Japan had not got rights of missionary works in China. Meanwhile, some Chinese local governments prevented Japanese monks missionary activities within their jurisdiction, on the basis of Japanese monks did not have missionary rights in China in accordance with treaties.
